

"Since returning to Halifax in 2000, Gloria reconnected with colleagues at the VGH Nurses Archives located in the Bethune Building of the VG Hospital. Since then, Gloria has devoted much volunteer time and effort to managing this hidden gem of artifacts and archival materials. She's also is in the processing of publishing a history of VGH Nurses and their role in many historical events of the past 100 years, and recently gave a talk on the subject at Government House. ANNA HAMILTON AWARD WINNER, WARREN ERVINE

An Anna Hamilton Award was posthumously given to Warren Ervine from Scott Manor House and the Fort Sackville Foundation in Bedford. Warren was nominated by Francene Cosman on behalf of the Fort Sackville Archives Committee, Francene Cosman wrote:

"Warren worked for eleven years as a dedicated volunteer archivist at the Scott Manor House in Bedford. Words cannot do justice to his lifetime contribution let alone the years spent with us at the Scott Manor House. He had presence. He had dignity. He had integrity. He had enthusiasm for life and nature. He had an outstanding work ethic and never refused to take on the many tasks of a volunteer. He was an inspiration and helped our organization to be the committed volunteer community that we are."

Warren's many archival projects for Scott Manor House included:

- Creating a map database for the more than 250 historic maps in the collection, for which he photographed, generated metadata, designed and created storage folders for each and every map.
- He also photographed and accessioned all 2000 items in the Manor's collection.

MEMBER UPDATES EASTERN SHORE ARCHIVES

The Eastern Shore Archives is wrapping up a PADP-funded project to digitize, inhouse, the entire Lena Ferguson fonds, consisting of 137 audio reels and 71 cassettes of interviews primarily from the Chezzetcook area of the Eastern Shore. The Lena Ferguson fonds was transferred under the Cooperative Acquisition Strategy in 2017 from the Nova Scotia Archives to the Eastern Shore Archives. The original recordings were carried out between 1971 and 1988 and submitted to the NSA in the late 1980s for duplication and the creation of preservation copies on audio reels.

The Eastern Shore Archives chose to digitize the reels in-house as a means to utilize the skills of a local audio technician while also taking advantage of real-time audio transfer to create an audio log of the contents of each interview. The audio logs and an updated fonds description will soon be available on MemoryNS and access copies of the interviews, many of which are with Acadian residents, will be available in MP3 format.

The most difficult aspect of this project was sourcing a professional quality reel-to-reel recorder! These are obsolete machines hoarded by sound recording collectors, and very difficult to obtain, especially in Pandemic times. The machine requires frequent servicing and often hourly cleaning, as well as a few engineering feats to create missing and broken parts.

The Eastern Shore Archives is proud to make these valuable recordings fully accessible and grateful for the PADP funding that allowed this project to take place. This project is part of the Eastern Shore Archives' goal of assembling all known Eastern Shore oral histories and making them available in either audio or transcript format. With the addition of the Lena Ferguson fonds recordings, we will have assembled over 200 oral histories!

MINUDIE HERITAGE ASSOCIATION

The Covid 19 pandemic has been a real, worldwide challenge for sure. As we read about how this virus was attacking innocent victims in other countries, we quickly came to the realization how very real it was on our own doorstep.

In April, we learned how to "Zoom." All of our in person monthly meetings ceased and we were thrown into the newest technology of which we became quite proficient.

Our fundraising ceased for the months of July and August but in September, we figured out how to have a yard sale using social distancing, arrows to control the movement of people, and limitations on the number of people entering our community hall. Masks and hand sanitizer were the number one priority.

Our school museum was closed this summer due to renovations, so in a way, it was perfect timing for the virus to come calling. Of special mention is that the CBC came to the community and did an article on the Acadian settlement that once was alive and well in Minudie.

What a year! We had a late start, opening July 6th, after we put Public Health measures in place for the Research Center and Archives along with the guidelines for the museum. We got through it by government assistance programs for COVID-19. We had a decrease in the tourists visiting the Museum, sales in the Gift Shop were down, plus we had no lottery and no big fundraiser. Our rentals of tables and chairs and hall space went up, however, and we looked for other ways to earn revenue.

We hired two students through federal grants. The students worked to update the data bases, made videos, helped with activities, and also catalogued museum artifacts. Our activities this year were all outdoors – a quilt show and celebrations in our founder was very well attended (keeping 6-ft apart and sanitizing a lot). We partnered with the Village historique de la Nouvelle-Écosse for Canada Day and August 15th. On Friday July 17th, we celebrated 367 years of history of the Barony of Pobomcoup, when Charles de la Tour appointed Philippe Mius d'Entremont as Baron of the Barony of Pobomcoup. Actors represented the descendants, we had a Powerpoint presentation of photos of the 2993 Pageant, and a collection of artifact reproductions and documents were on display.

We received a grant to study the partnership between the Village historique Acadien de la Nouvelle-Écosse. We are also entering into partnership with the Municipality of Argyle for the construction of a library on the land owned by the Société historique acadienne de Pubnico-Ouest. In 2024, our region of Argyle and Clare will be hosting the Acadian World Congress. We are certainly looking to ameliorate our services, experiences, products, culture, history, and heritage for the Congress, plus volunteers are continually entering genealogical data in our data base.

La Société Saint-Pierre

As all others, we at La Société Saint-Pierre (Les Trois Pignons) in Chéticamp have had to adjust our ways of doing things in a very drastic way. We lost over 80% of our visitors and even more in revenue. With the assistance of the federal government, we were able to remain open and assure that our seasonal staff were able to return. Just preparing the building to meet the requirements of NS Health took some time and adjustments.

We took advantage of the extra time and slower traffic to address tasks that we normally did not have time to do. We took our time to do a full inventory of our collection, sorted out files, painted most of the interior of the museum and the offices, made some changers in the museum to accommodate some new acquisitions, and organized our storage space. We also took advantage of more online courses being offered from the safety of our offices.



We also offered virtual programming by organizing events for Mi-carême, Canada Day, Festival de l'Escaouette and National Acadian Day. This was very much appreciated by locals and families whose planned trips home were disrupted because of the pandemic.



Much like everywhere else, the Yarmouth County Museum and Archives was affected by the current pandemic. However, we have adapted, and while things are slightly different nowadays, we have made it work. We moved many events online and have been able to work on, and complete, many projects. As everyone knows, there's always work to be done in archives, and these past few months we've gotten a lot done. Some projects we've worked on have been: creating digital archival packages; a 10-part video series featuring archival and museum items; and the conversion of our publications to e-books. While we worked from home from March to May, we still provided research services for individuals and upon reopening in June, we did so with a new

The deadline for receipt at the Nova Scotia Archives is 4:00 p.m. 16 April 2021 to submit an electronic copy. Signed paper originals must be mailed to the Nova Scotia Archives, postmarked no later than midnight 16 April 2021. No extensions will be given.
